I have heard people exclaim in horror and read so many panicking Facebook posts about the sand erosion from Jonas that I thought some more realistic comments might be welcome.

I went out yesterday to see for myself what Jonas had done to the Bethany shoreline and although a chunk of artificial sand dune was eaten away I was heartened to see a

beach much larger and more natural in formation than I've seen since the replenishment projects began ~ and people are finding an abundance of beautiful seashells, sea glass and pieces of old pottery once again!

before beach replenishment.

Bethany is scheduled for replenishment in 2017. I for one am not in favor of trying to best Mother Nature. It's a losing game and extremely costly - both financially to taxpayers everywhere in the country and humanly to those swimming and body surfing in our waters.

It's gone largely unreported how the hard, steep drop-off in the surf zone created by beach replenishment has caused numerous life-altering injuries, crippling and death. I know that's not a popular thing to say and that's why it doesn't get reported, but I've heard too much and know an outgoing, intelligent, wonderful woman whose life has become painful and extremely restricted because one day she decided to body surf after the shoreline was altered by replenishment.

I would much rather have a natural beach and know my family and everyone else is safer ~ and have the fun of finding beautiful beach treasures once again than have more sand replenishment. I bet the local sea life would favor that, too....
